Mr Waldeck and Miss Johns have thoroughly enjoyed the Early Years Stay and Play sessions last term and there have been various requests for Stay and Play to continue during the spring term. Early Years parents have said that they would like to know more about how to support their child with phonics at home so we will be running Phonics and Play sessions on Mondays after school. This club will allow parents and children to spend 20 minutes engaging in phonics related activities and games and the children will then be able to choose their own resources to play with for the remainder of the session. This will not only help the children but also help you with ideas on how to support your child's reading at home.

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What have we been up to? Year 1 Update

We have had a very busy and exciting term in Year 1 and have worked incredibly hard! Our overall theme this term has been 'Me and My Community' and we have enjoyed looking at this more deeply in different subjects.

In Science we have been identifying different parts of our body, including our senses. We have really enjoyed experimenting with our senses; taking part in tasting tests, using smelling pots and finding out all about the eye! We finished the term by looking at the changes in the seasons and enjoyed seeing the effect of Autumn as we walked through Burnham Park. We can now spot evergreen and deciduous trees and a different variety of common plants. This term we will be looking at 'The Animal Kingdom', which we're sure will be an exciting topic.



We have been learning to use lots of different operations this term in Maths! This term we have focussed on how we add, subtract and multiply using images to help us solve sums. We have also been learning how to use different tools in Numeracy, familiarising ourselves with number lines and squares to help us work with some really big numbers!



One of our favourite weeks of last term was Literacy Week where we learned about Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. We wrote wanted posters for an Oompa Loompa that escaped from the factory, invented and created our own sweets and wrote instructions for how to make them.

In Geography we have been thinking about our local community and creating maps of familiar places. We have also been evaluating our playground - discussing features we like and things we might want to change - to create a happy environment which all the children can enjoy.

In History we have been thinking about how things change over time. We gathered information about our family history and wrote a fact file. We then sorted objects into those we used when we were a baby and those we use now and then wrote a recount of our first day at Lent Rise School! We also loved the Battle of Hastings day which inspired some fantastic literacy work.



One of our highlights last term was visiting Burnham Library. We had so much fun reading different books and loved the librarian's stories! We chose some books to borrow which then inspired us to write our own book reviews.



In Art we have been using different mediums to create self-portraits such as charcoal, pencils and paints. We have also carefully practised how to make dark and light marks and use pencils to create different strokes. In Design and Technology we have been building on our artistic skills by designing our own mosaics for Lent Rise School! We evaluated some mosaics already in school and then worked to a design brief to create our own.

We are sure this will be another great term and we are looking forward to learning lots more!

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What do you like about homework?

The most common themes throughout the responses were reinforcing learning and helping parents to understand what the children are learning and progressing with.

Some examples of responses are below:

A Year 2 parent said:

"I think it's an important part of the child's learning curve to be able to take what they have learnt in school and apply this independently away from the school environment. It helps to reinforce their learning. Also it allows parents to get involved with the child's learning as well and see what they have been doing in school."

A Year 6 parent said:

"It is good to see my child enthusiastic about a subject and excited to research and produce their homework. It is also good to know what they are studying at school and see how things like their handwriting is improving"

What do you not like about homework?

The most common themes of responses were that homework is difficult to manage effectively around family life, it can be inconsistent across the school and there is confusion around online homework.

A sample of responses are below:

A Year 4 parent said

"Very difficult to fit other activities around it, especially for young children with early bedtimes. Which means my son's week becomes very academic with little time for creative/sport/outdoor/family activities."

A Year 6 parent said:

"Sometimes parents are unable to help children because they don't understand the curriculum way of teaching and can often confuse children. There needs to be a way to help parents understand the topic and how best to teach their kids, especially Maths."

A Year 4 parent said:

"Holiday homework especially October/February where you only have a week can encroach on family time and family holidays. Holidays should be for downtime, children to do their own activities and not school work. It prepares children for a good work/life balance in the future allowing them to differentiate between the two."

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Do you have any further comments to make?

An Early Years parent said:

"I like how the homework links back to lessons in school, it increases her understanding and language around her lessons. It also keeps her interest and encourages conversations at home. She loves drawing pictures and writing about what she has learnt. Overall I think the level of homework is about right but I'd like there to be optional homework for children who are interested in doing more."

A Year 3 parent said:

"The reputation around homework in Lent Rise is very well known in the local area and I am aware of families who have chosen not to send their child to Lent Rise for fear of the pressure of the homework. I feel the school needs to look very closely at what other schools in the area are doing, what current research says about the benefits of homework and reconsider who the homework is for. Is it for the benefit of the children or is it to placate parents who believe homework is essential for academic achievement? Also I'd like to say thank you for consulting the parents on this. We have all noticed that since the last Ofsted inspection the homework amount has got more sensible and that's good but it's still not right."

A Year 1 parent said:

"Our young son (August birthday) found homework tiring in the reception year but a year on we are very glad he got into the habit from the outset. It seems important that the school and parents are able to support a child's learning and development together."

A Year 5 parent said:

"I think I would like to see more focus on Maths and English and use homework as a revision tool with the weekend for more creative work."

A Year 3 parent said:

"Finding a homework solution that everyone will be happy with and will suit every child is impossible. I like the homework grid which gives a choice of activities. It would help if holiday homework was optional."
